## Some Important Reminders

### ***District Taxes Due***

The Farmington Woods District third quarter installment of the 2025/2026 fiscal year tax is due on January 1, and becomes delinquent on February 1, 2026. Any amount delinquent will result in the assessment of an interest penalty of 1.5% per month or portion of month. Your statement will either be mailed or emailed based on how you have requested to receive it.

## A Friendly Reminder from the Snow Removal Team

Please be considerate when parking in overflow parking areas during the winter months. Whenever possible, vehicles should be moved to allow our snow removal crews to clear Common Area parking spots. Your neighbors will appreciate the areas being cleared before the snow gets packed down and icy. Keep in mind that the Farmington Woods rules do not allow for extended parking or vehicle storage in open parking areas: Per Rule 5.3.3, *"No vehicle may be stored or left immobile in any open parking area for any period of time in excess of fourteen consecutive days."*

Parking in front of detached garages is prohibited at all times. Blocking these spaces impedes snow removal equipment, emergency vehicles, mail carriers and garbage trucks and prevents your neighbors from accessing their own garages. Per Rule 5.3.4, *"No vehicle may be parked in a manner that blocks access for other residents entering and exiting their designated garages. Parking of any vehicle is prohibited in front of detached multi-bay garages and in front of garages that do not have a limited common element driveway."*

When snow has been forecasted, please take a minute to check your sidewalk and driveway for items such as newspapers and electrical cords for holiday lighting. Snow removal equipment can suffer damage or mechanical problems resulting from obstacles and debris in driveways and on walkways. Additionally, please remove planter boxes and other items that may be in front of your garage and can impede our progress or be damaged by snow plows. Your assistance is appreciated and can prevent equipment downtime and help us ensure timely snow removal.

### Division of Responsibility

The Master Association is responsible for snow removal on roads, driveways, paths, walks, steps, doorways and garage areas.

Please remember that residents are responsible for snow removal on their own decks, patios and porches.

Additionally, residents are reminded that they are responsible for and must remove snow and ice from outside furnace and appliance vents, heat pumps, condensing units and generators. Proper air flow is needed for the safe operation of gas furnaces, generators, heat pumps, condensers and appliances and blocked vents may lead to toxic fumes and a dangerous build-up of carbon monoxide inside the home.

Shoveling priority is given to the 555 walk-out units that are not attached to garages. We rotate the starting points for each storm. Residents can be a big help as we dig out our eight miles of sidewalks and twelve miles of roads, by removing any obstacles – planter boxes, electrical cords for holiday lighting, newspapers – that can impede the safe and timely progress of the plows or shovels.



### Winter Weather Maintenance

The Grounds crew will continue leaf-blowing and pruning as long as the weather allows, and the Buildings crew will continue to work on maintenance work requests. If we get snow, the entire maintenance crew turns to plowing and shoveling.



## Free Unit Winterizing

We cannot urge you more strongly. The resulting damage from frozen water pipes can run into tens of thousands of dollars for you as individual owners and for Farmington Woods. To help you prevent this, the Maintenance Department is now offering a free winterizing service for all residents who leave their homes for the winter.

Winterizing involves:

- Closing the main water valve at the meter
- Blowing the water lines out (including the dishwasher and washing machine)
- Shutting off and blowing out water heaters
- Putting anti-freeze in kitchen sinks, tubs and toilets

### Inside Cold Weather Reminders

Whether you are leaving for months or for a shorter time in the winter you should be sure to:

- Set your thermostat to at least 55 degrees or higher.
- Leave your bathroom and kitchen sink doors open.
- Turn off the main water valve. If you are not sure where this is, contact the Master Association.
- Be sure that there is a working key to your condo and a key for your garage at the front gate house so that in an emergency a crew can come in.
- Leave a contact number or address with a neighbor or the M.A. office so that if there is an emergency, we can get in touch with you.
- Ask a friend or neighbor to check your unit occasionally.
- You might also wish to leave a light on a timer somewhere in your unit.

### Outside Cold Weather Reminders

**Hoses:** Remember to disconnect your garden hose from your outside faucet during the colder freezing months to allow the hose bib to drain. Failure to do so during freezing temperatures may result in a burst water pipe.

### Keep Your Garage Doors Closed

Keep garage doors closed at all times (except when entering and exiting) to keep water pipes which may be located within the walls from freezing. Also, keeping garage doors closed will shut out wildlife looking for warm places.

## The Importance of Proper Footwear in Winter: How to Avoid Slips and Falls

Winter weather, like snow and ice, often coats roadways, sidewalks, and other surfaces, making them slippery. One of the most overlooked yet crucial aspects of winter safety is the choice of footwear. The right pair of shoes protects against frostbite and other cold-related illnesses. It also prevents slips and falls.





## Fireplace Safety

*Approved by M.A. Board 3/25/2024:*

**3.6.1** Fireplaces installed in Farmington Woods units are for aesthetic purposes and not intended to heat the unit. The fireplace structure installed in Farmington Woods' units is not designed for superheated materials (see Regulation 3.6.4). Alterations and additions to the fireplace, to include alternate sources of heating, must be approved by the Design Review Committee and town governing agencies.



**3.6.2** The Master Association provides for fireplace and chimney inspections every three years. The cost of these inspections is borne by the Master Association. Any repair of the chimney above the fireplace flue is the responsibility of the Master Association. The Unit Owner is responsible for cleaning of the chimney flue as well as repair to the fireplace including fire brick. The chimney must be cleaned yearly if the fireplace is used to burn wood.

**3.6.3** A fireplace found defective is not to be used until the defect is repaired. Violations of the above rules and regulations may result in a fine imposed by the Master Association.

**3.6.4** Fireplaces in Farmington Woods are not designed for heating the unit. Except for kindling, the burning of wood scraps, scrap lumber and softwood is prohibited. Only use dry, seasoned hard firewood (oak, maple, birch, etc.) The use of lighter fluids and artificial logs is prohibited. The burning of paper and magazines is prohibited. See also, Maintenance, Repair and Replacement Standards, item 8. Chimney Flues and Fireplaces, on page 13.

**3.6.5** Install smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in the unit. Test alarms at least once a month to ensure they are working properly, and replace the batteries every six months. The detectors should be replaced at least every ten years. Keep a fire extinguisher within quick reach of your fireplace.

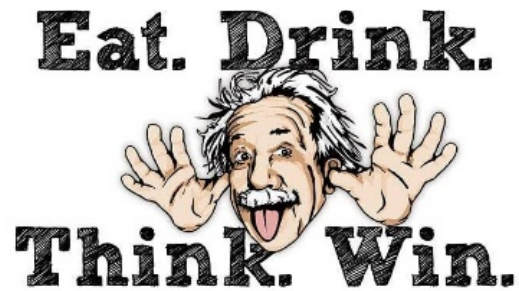

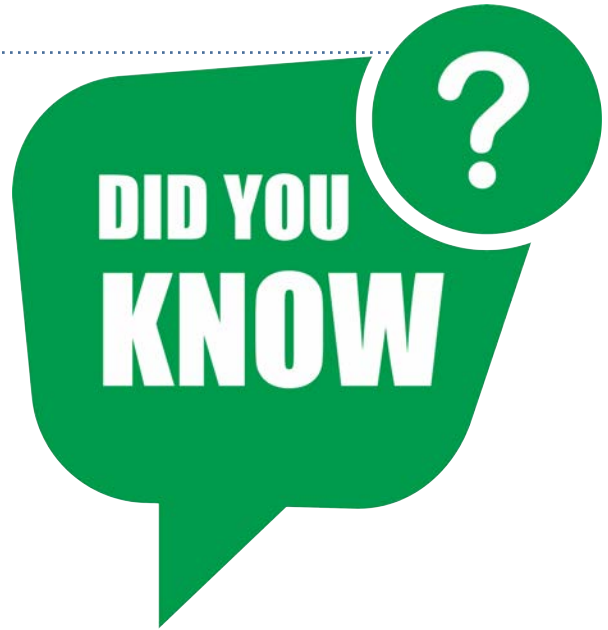

### *Important Safety Reminder Regarding School Bus Stops*

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### *Sledding and Snowshoeing on the Golf Course*

Once there is a solid base of six inches of snow, you can't do much better than the 12th fairway on our own golf course for sledding. The 12th fairway is located between Catalpa Court and Lower Byron Drive. Other great areas for sledding are also on the 3rd and 9th fairways.

Snowshoers and cross country skiers have free range, but please be on the lookout for the roped off tee areas – please avoid snowshoeing, walking, or cross country skiing on these areas in order to protect them from being damaged. Your cooperation is appreciated so the golf course will be in good shape for golfers in the spring.

# Cooperative Garden at Farmington Woods

## History of the Cooperative Garden

Well, it's certainly not the season for outdoor vegetable planting, but it IS a season for contemplation about how things *might* have been, and what *is* a significant gift to all of us. Literally. The holidays are always about tradition and history – cultural, family, personal. How about some Cooperative Garden history?

If you go up the hill between the 4<sup>th</sup> green and the 5<sup>th</sup> fairway, what you will see is not what we have always had. Originally, back after the earth cooled, much of Farmington Woods was a dairy/tobacco farm. The driveway up the hill was a pathway, but for cows to come down the hill, cross Roaring Brook and graze on what is now the 5<sup>th</sup> fairway. Now we complain about goose droppings but imagine how delightful it must have been after a moo cow walkover.

When Farmington Woods was born the hill that is now the upper and lower gardens were the tee boxes for the 5<sup>th</sup> fairway. If you picture it, it screamed for a powerful draw off the tee or a nice, well-placed straight tee shot. How foolish! This is golf already! Many shots were rifled into the parking lot and even up the hill into the condo units. So, the tee boxes were moved to their present locale. Then a Christmas miracle occurred, or, rather, some forward thinking.

The founding parents thought a community garden would be a nice amenity to fill empty ground and the Community Garden was born. Originally, it consisted of garden plots cut into the grass – no borders, no fencing, but regularly mowed, AND with readily available water (after all, when it was a tee box, it needed to be watered). Irene Loretto negotiated a budget of \$15,000 to fence in the gardens since they were consistently ravaged by deer. The next evolution was the “Energizer Bunny” Billy Weikert hauling in lumber and slowly but surely building borders for the garden plots. Over the years through a succession of garden committees, the garden grew into what you

see now with the addition of sheds, a farm table, workshops, service days, garden parties, product purchases and delivery, garden tools, and at one time a greenhouse, an active committee, and an active community of gardeners.

The garden has been a gift for a variety of reasons – health, social, cultural, and team-building. It's like the Joni Mitchell song with the lyrics, “You don't know what you've got 'til it's gone.”

The garden was a godsend during the not-too-distant past of the Covid epidemic. We went from community to wasteland. We were all frightened of human contact. And what couldn't you negotiate for a roll of toilet paper. The Garden was a perfect solution to social distancing. You were outside, in the open air, masks weren't mandatory, AND you could safely socialize with real people, even if meant yelling to the next inhabited garden. And, since we're an organic garden (yes, we are!), you could grow vegetables in which you had confidence. It was also the year when we had a Tailgate Oktoberfest in the clubhouse parking lot with safe distance between cars and tables, a keg of German beer and bratwursts, pork sandwiches, sauerkraut and Riesling. I even wore lederhosen. I think that's why we never repeated the event. Those were the days, my friends!

Covid emphasized just one benefit of the Garden – built in social distancing. There are additional benefits very germane to maintaining a thriving community like Farmington Woods. The Garden is diverse in diverse ways (pretty clever word usage there). There are gardeners from so many backgrounds who choose to have a garden for many different reasons. Local markets might have that unique vegetable that you can grow yourself. If you walked through the garden in August you would see a fair amount of different plants like sesame leaf, crooked neck squash, gourds, white cucumbers, etc.

Prior to Covid when we held potluck events, the variety of dishes were fantastic: samosas, Korean chicken salad, kielbasa and cabbage, etc. Shared recipes and shared experience were the order of the day. We're hoping to bring these back in 2026. The key element is people talking to people and sharing. That's a main theme of the garden which we hope to nurture and for which we should all be thankful.

Our gardeners have a variety of motivation. Many people move to Farmington Woods because of downsizing. A cost of that downsizing might be losing a garden. The Coop Garden can fill that gap, with an added benefit. Make new friends. Meeting new people in a new location may not be easy for some folks. Participation in the garden, or even sharing a garden, is an easy way to meet people and start conversations. You may want to try something new and may not know how. The Coop Garden schedules workshops which almost GUARANTEE first year success. Don't know where to start? A workshop is a great place to begin.

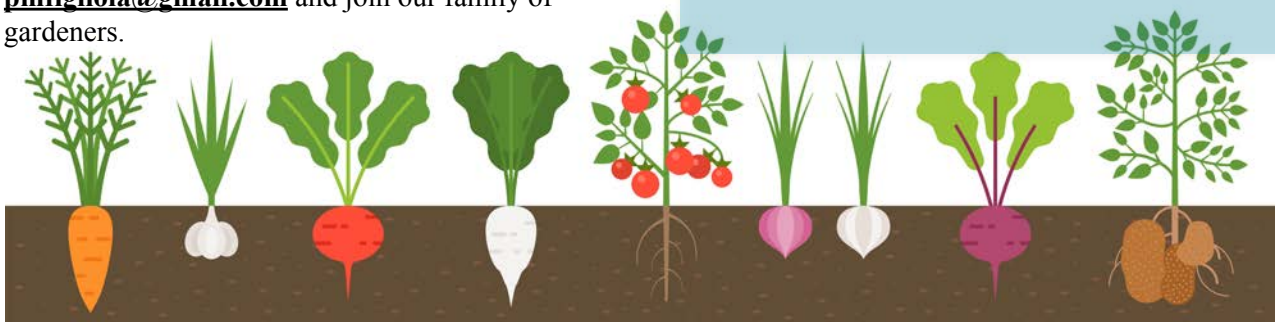
